

happens to be inserted.—The evening papers generally copy their reports, &c., from the morning papers, and therefore are only put to the expense of an editor and a translator, besides collectors of city and foreign news, journals, &c.

The morning papers each engage about twenty compositors, six or eight pressmen, besides the assistance of boys, &c. The evening papers and weekly journals also have those persons to a proportionable extent. Thus the expense of the composition of a newspaper, first, in procuring intelligence; secondly, in employing writers; and thirdly, for compositors, pressmen, &c., is immense; in some instances as much as 400*l.* and 500*l.* a week; besides the expenditure for house-room, type, clerks, &c., not forgetting the *stamp duty*, which is more than half the amount for which the paper is at last sold by the newsmen to the public—the duty being *fourpence*, and the paper only *sevenpence*.
